Ocean Education in Action

We continued to grow our ocean education programming this year through youth workshops, as well as new opportunities for learners of all ages. It was a joy to be back with our friends at **Waynflete School** in Portland, ME for two weeklong summer workshops with young students. We had an especially memorable experience with young learners on **Isle au Haut**, an island community in Penobscot Bay, during a weeklong program in August (see a dispatch from Lexi reflecting on that program below). And this fall, 4th graders from **Presumpscot Elementary**, a Portland Public School, joined us at Willard Beach for an ocean education field trip.

In an effort to broaden our reach and provide accessible and enriching educational experiences, we organized two all-ages events. The first was our **Geology Walk** with Malcolm Hill, a professor at Northeastern University and member of Saltwater Classroom's Board of Advisors. Secondly, we gathered for a **Seaweed Walk** with Lareen Smith, a professor of phycology (the study of algae) at Southern Maine Community College. **Stay tuned for more events such as these in 2024!**

Tech-Integrated Platform for Ocean Education


In 2023, we garnered significant funding and enthusiasm for our innovative Phase II — a online platform with the goal of **increasing nature-based ocean education in an accessible, engaging way**. Such support includes the Maine Technology Institute, Frances R. Dewing Foundation, and Davis Conservation Foundation.

PHASE II OBJECTIVES & GOALS:

Equitable Access to Ocean Education

A major goal of Phase II is to increase and diversify the reach of our curriculum by partnering with schools to offer transformative learning experiences with reduced financial and geographic barriers. The accessible nature of our platform will help create a more diverse network of ocean-focused learners and problem solvers.

Hands-on Nature Learning

Through our tech-integrated approach, we aim to provide engaging and interactive activities that allow students to explore and connect with the marine environment, even if they are unable to physically visit the coast. Through virtual activities, real-life experiments, and interactive modules, we seek to create a dynamic and inclusive experience that fosters a deep connection to the ocean.

Blue Economy Workforce Development

We hope to increase interest among young learners in marine careers through heightened exposure to marine and STEM trades, as well as Blue Economy career pathways. The Saltwater Classroom Platform has the power to motivate a diverse generation of tenacious leaders in the ocean-driven workforce.

Rubbish Project Recap

By the numbers, <u>Rubbish Project</u> held 11 clean-up events, engaged 545 community volunteers, and removed **1,381 pounds of trash** from our environment this year. Quite the impact, we'd say! These efforts are a collaboration between Saltwater Classroom and <u>GoGo Refill</u> and are designed to spark engagement and conversation around issues of trash and the power of individual impact. 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
